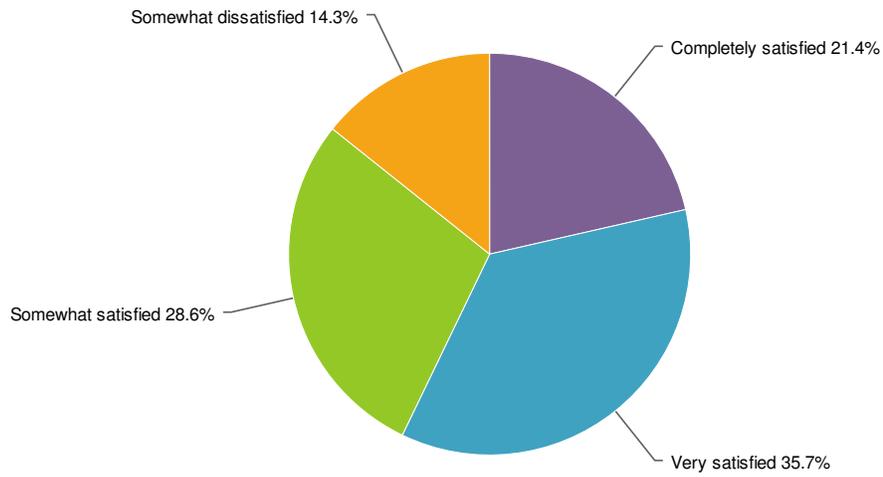

1	It provided me with lots of things to think about. It also helped me gain insights into how the course eval process should work.

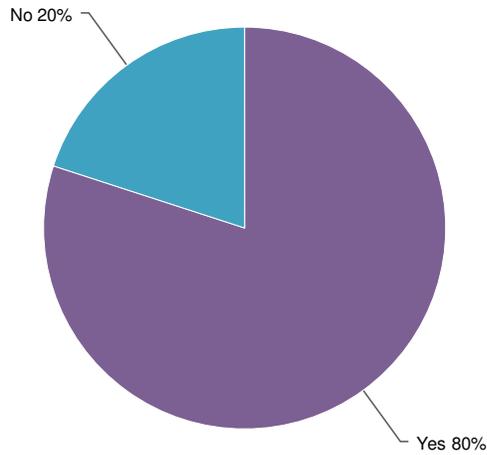
Count Response

1	Not what we expected. We were hoping for more practical strategies. Our institutional structure limits our ability to implement much of what was presented.
1	This course provided useful tools and a framework for their use. The sessions were divided into manageable chunks. The assignments were not overly time consuming and the feedback was helpful.
1	Helpful for appreciating the difficulty of teaching an online course. Concerned about whether new online instructors are receiving adequate development, particularly when many instructors are PhD students. Realization that should be asking students different evaluation questions of instructors--should ask them to describe instructor's behaviors. And ask students to self-report their own efforts at engaging with the course and instructor. Screen-captured materials were difficult to read.
1	The material presented provided us good reminders or things to "keep in mind" in evaluation. My background is evaluation and we are looking at our emerging online programs, so I know the distinction between formative and summative evaluation and how that differs from formal and informal, which I am not sure the presenters understand- or at least did not articulate clearly. The course served as a good meta-review of our online evaluations, making us think about what we are doing and why, but so much redundancy in terms of "evaluate the delivery, not the content or the course." Review of the tools was helpful to know what was out there, but good evaluators can devise their own tools that apply to their institution.
1	We were under the impression that the focus was going to be on the whole campus level, not on individual courses or individual faculty members new to online teaching. The first session was good and applicable, but the second and third were too basic and not as informative for whole campus initiatives.
1	Great information, research and insight. I realize all organizational context differ, but was hoping to hear more stories from other Universities on how they have implemented online teaching evaluation of faculty thoughtfully and successfully at their institutions. Tools will be helpful. Having access to the course for one year is great.

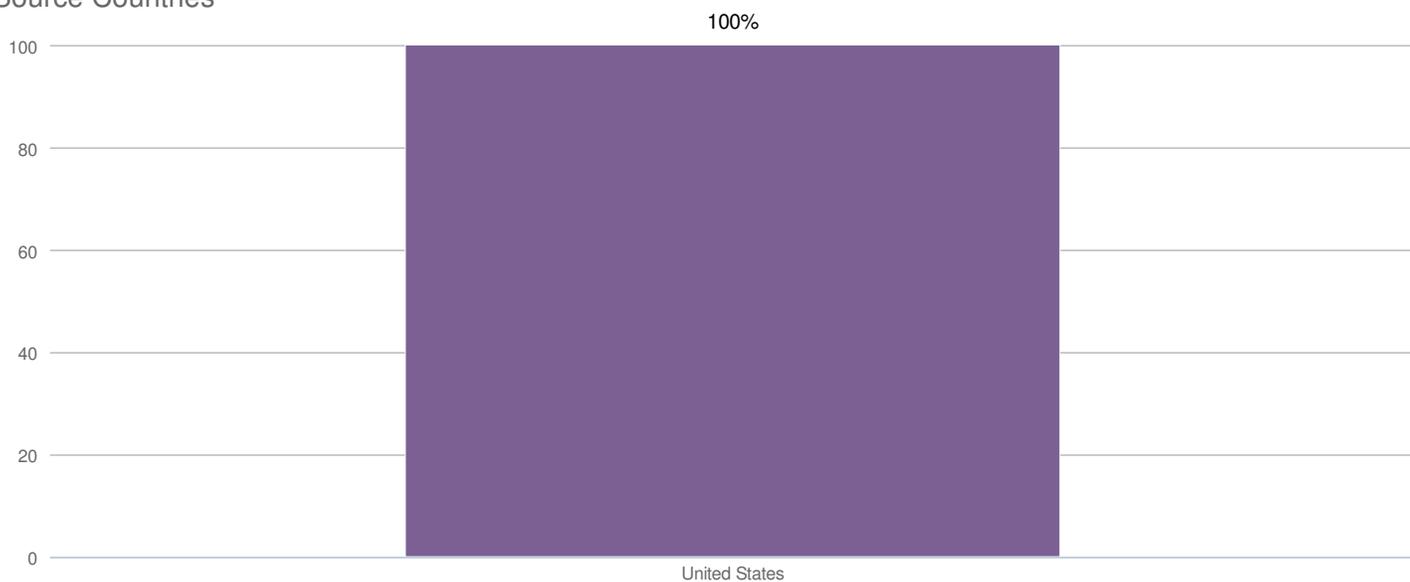
1	wasnt sure when the sessions actually started; seemed like they were starting 15 minutes early

1	We are in a unique situation with an evaluation specialist on staff, so our ratings were likely a bit harsh for those that don't have such a luxury. A briefer course covering some best practices may be more helpful, even if offered on-demand.
1	Course on developing effective modules for supporting faculty, grad students who teaching online for the first time.
1	Recommend that you use the video webcams to personalize the experience more by seeing our presenters
1	allow for more interaction between the participants and presenters. so many people in the room made it hard to keep up with what was going on; better leverage twitter for backchannel communications and networking
1	Retitle the course to better reflect the content. It should be just called "How to Evaluate Online Teaching".

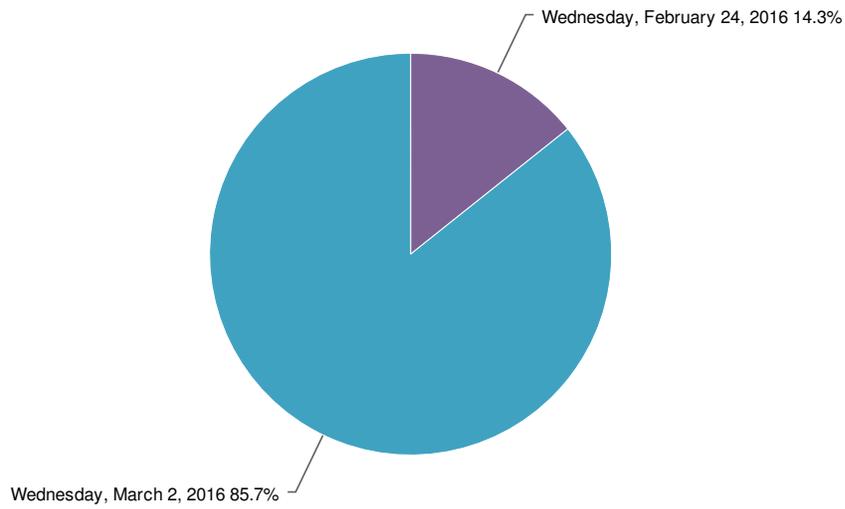

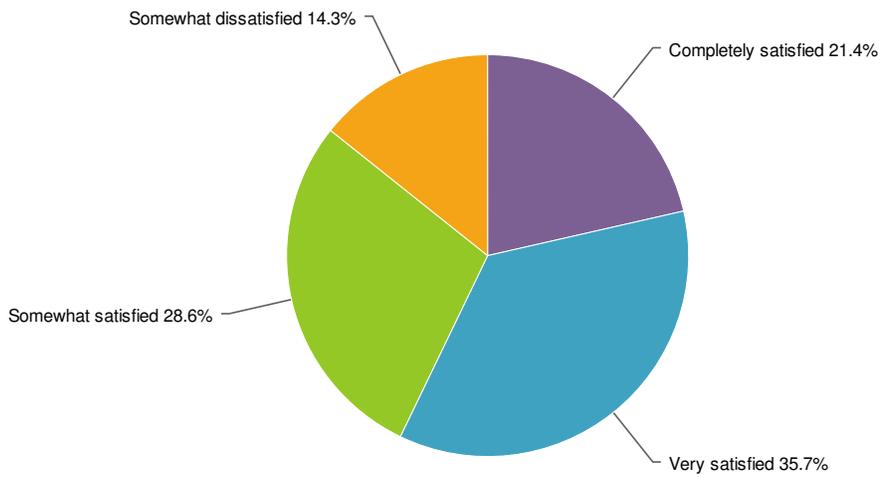

We agree that instructor review is important -- what are some specific examples of instructor presence or lack thereof in online courses? What are the best practices with regard to instructor presence? In addition to being hard to see on-screen, the Sal Monella course did not really show enough info to demonstrate any of the points the presenter was trying to make. How did the course embody teaching principles outlined in Gamson & Chickering?
1	It seems that when i sign in a few minutes early to make sure my technology is working correctly that the webinar has already started. Not sure what is going on
1	Some helpful information was shared, but too much of a focus on course components that are not applicable to all courses (i.e., rubrics, "collaboration"). Not everything needs to be graded via rubric and not every assignment needs to be collaborative. It's hard to present specifics that apply to everyone, and the general information is not detailed enough.
1	Good session - but the screenshots on the sample class were impossible for me to read and comment on effectively.
